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
Heritage Houses in Mullumbimby

At <u>Byron Local Environmental Plan 2014 - NSW Legislation</u> is a list of 22 Mullumbimby houses deemed worthy of classification as 'Heritage Items' under *Schedule 5 - Environmental Heritage* of the *Byron Local Environmental Plan 2014*. (The jewel in the crown is arguably Cedar House in Dalley Street, which is also listed with the National Trust.)

The list stemmed from the Byron Shire Community-Based Heritage Study of 2007, authored by Dr Donald Ellsmore in conjunction with the Byron Shire Council, members of the Byron Shire Community-Based Heritage Study Steering Committee, Mr Peter Stolz, Dr Brett Stubbs and community volunteers..., including contributions from Chris and Robyn Gray on Mullumbimby nominations. The simple statement, *Heritage consists of places and objects inherited from the past that we as a community want to hand on to future generations...*, is bureaucratically prescribed at <u>Assessing-Heritage-Significance.pdf</u>. A property owner whose home is *Listed in the heritage schedule of a local council's Local Environmental Plan (LEP)...* is obliged to comply with the provisions of Para *5.10 Heritage Conservation* at https://legislation.nsw.gov.au/view/html/inforce/current/epi-2014-0297#sec.5.10..., and presumably policed by council inspectors.

Since compilation of the list in 2007 a few of the registered houses have deteriorated, while some others have been given makeovers and/or subdivided for Airbnb. Conversely, along with the boom of recent years many non-listed houses have been restored and revealed themselves to be worthy of consideration as 'Heritage Items', particularly so at the top end of the market, which enjoyed a mini-renaissance thanks to some pedantic owner-occupiers. But the rebirthing of other Heritage candidates by investors and absentee landlords continues to change the ambience of the town as houses are altered to squeeze in rental rooms and large blocks partitioned or subdivided to accommodate bland boxes, presumably countenanced on the grounds of relieving the housing crisis.


To ensure preservation of some veneer of yesteryear ahead of the profiteers, a short list of additional houses for heritage listing would likely include 'Wiloona' at 5 Main Arm Road (but probably beyond redemption), the relatively unmolested Bridgland House at 14 Station St., Dr Singh/Kesteven's Residence at 8 Jubilee St., Headmaster's House 14 Jubilee St., Methodist Manse 138 Dalley St., The Brunswick Hospital 25 Dalley St., War Widow's Cottage 34 Gordon St.... Take a stroll

around town and judge for yourself (or go for a virtual tour from the comfort of your loungeroom via dated Google Maps.) If you have a favourite building let us know and we'll coordinate a joint submission to the *Byron Shire Council's Heritage Advisory Committee*. (Or if you find nothing of virtue consider whether the current list, detailed below, should be culled to keep numbers in manageable proportions and not devalue the register's raison d'être.)







The Police Residence

The Police Residence (Item ID No 9.100 at <u>Community-Based-Heritage-Study-volume-1-coordinators-report</u>) was recommended for heritage blessing but was amongst those places that *do not meet the threshold for listing according to available information about heritage significance and/or is within a nominated heritage conservation area.*

The original building served as the Police Station at Brunswick Heads and was erected 1885 by carpenter/builder **Alex Brown**, nephew-in-law of **Robert Marshall**. It served as Mullum's combined residence and police station from 1897 until the pukka combined station and courthouse were erected next door in 1907. A year later the residence was also given a makeover, marking the start of progressive upgrades that changed the face of the place, particularly major modifications 1935. Until recently it was connected to the courthouse by a unifying period fence.

The core of the current bland police residence on the prominent CBD site on the Burringbar/Dalley corner, may still qualify the place as the oldest house in Mullumbimby. If not, then the rapidly deteriorating ex-stationmaster's house (built 1894) wears the mantle. Hopefully some accommodation can be made to include the Stationmaster's residence in the rehabilitation of the car graveyard at the end of the 'temporary pod' accommodation.

In NSW Govt Gazette of 7Jul1907 (Issue 84) Government Architect's Branch called tenders for 'Erection of Police Buildings, Mullumbimby' (Prob means new brick courthouse and police station – Northern Star 10Sep1907 says C.B. Smith of Hornsby wins contract for both £1596)
